#### Interim Reports - Information about this new initiative

Progress Reports will be made available via Compass in the final week of Term 1 for every student. These are designed to help prepare for our Parent Teacher Interviews which are being held on the first day back of Term 2 – Monday 15<sup>th</sup> April 2024.

Progress Reports are designed to give parents and carers a general indication of how their child has begun the school year. Their purpose is to provide you with a baseline for discussing your child's strengths and areas for improvement at the Parent Teacher Interviews.

The Progress Reports will have the following four categories: **Effort** - The amount of energy and focus your child puts into their academic tasks and learning activities.

**Behaviour** – The actions, attitudes, and conduct of your child within the classroom environment.

**Organisation** – Your child's management of instructional materials, resources, and activities to support effective teaching and learning.

**Learning Progress** – The learning growth of your child's knowledge, skills, and understanding since the start of this year in response to instruction and experiences. This is not a judgement of their progress against the Victorian Curriculum but rather an indication of their general learning growth.

Teachers will be using the ratings of: Excellent, Very Good, Good, Acceptable and Needs Attention for each category.

#### **Prep**

The Prep students are making great progress with their Sounds Write learning. They have completed two Sounds Write units including the sounds /a/, /i/, /m/, /s/, /t/, /n/, /o/ and /p/. They are now beginning to read and write many words and they have been enjoying locating words they know in picture story books. In Maths the Preps have been practising subitising, Subitising is the ability to look at a small set of objects and instantly know how many there are without counting them. The students are enjoying playing lots of dice games to develop a quick recall of the dot dice number formations. They have also been practising saying the the days of the week in order and using ordinal number from 1st to 10th.

In our general studies, students have been learning about our school values; Commitment, Respect and Empathy. We have read many stories that have helped students to gain an understanding of what these words mean and how they can show them in their actions at school.



#### Health and Physical Education - Term 1

First Term is always busy in relation to school sport. Our PE programs align with the sports program to prepare students for upcoming events. Particular focus during Term 1 is athletics where students are challenged with more complex techniques for field events. Year 10 students have also been investigating invasion sports applying a variety of strategies and tactics to different games.

During health sessions, Year 7-9 students have focused on mental health and wellbeing activities. Year 10 students have furthered their understanding of nutrition, investigating different diets and looking critically at health information.

#### A few reminders:

For PE classes, students are required to have their PE uniform. This includes a change of shirt, shorts and shoes, a change of socks is also encouraged. The PE uniform is essential for personal hygiene and for safe participation in class activities. Time is allocated each session for students to get changed.

For health classes students are reminded to turn up with all equipment which includes their My Wellbeing Journal.

#### **DEAN WHITEHEAD**

#### **MATHS BLURB**

Students from years 7 to 10 have been busy building their maths knowledge and skills since the start of the year.

#### Year 10 maths classes:

Students in year 10 are currently studying Linear Relationships and their graphs; learning to solve a variety of linear equations and recognise the special features of linear graphs. Students are starting to think about their pathways in terms of the maths they wish to study in year 11 and beyond. Effort and commitment in year 10 helps build a strong foundation of maths knowledge and skills for VCE.

#### Year 9 maths classes:

Year 9 students have been furthering their understanding of Probability. They have been learning to interpret a variety of representations such as Venn diagrams, tree diagrams and grids to assist in determining the probability of two-step experiments. Students are about to start an investigative CAT for this topic.

#### Year 8 maths classes:

Year 8 students have been building on their prior learning and experiences in Number and expanding their Algebra knowledge and skills. From learning to classify numbers as rational or irrational, students were introduced to pi and found that it wasn't easy to obtain an accurate measurement of the circumference of a circular object. They expanded their understanding of the index laws and how mathematical notation can simplify calculations involving extremely small and large numbers.

#### Fun fact:

Pi Day (Thursday March 14<sup>th</sup>) coincides with Albert Einstein's birthday, adding an extra layer of significance for maths and science enthusiasts. Pi Day was first celebrated by physicist Larry Shaw in 1988 at the San Francisco Exploration, where staff and public marched around a circular space and then consumed fruit pies!

Other known fact: Mr Mottram is keen to have a celebratory luncheon for 'Pi Day' as he loves pies! Scallop pies from Port Fairy, Ned Kelly pies and pie floaters. Could be a good statistical investigation about favourite pies here!

#### Year 7 maths classes:

Year 7 student to their teacher "Are you going to make our brains hurt again today?"

Teacher: "Yes, I hope so because that means you are learning something new!" Hopefully "hurt" in a good way as brain science tells us the following:

Neuroplasticity is the brain's ability to change and adapt due to experience. It is an umbrella term referring to the brain's ability to change, reorganize, or grow neural networks. This can involve functional changes due to learning something new.

Year 7 students have been revisiting and furthering a range of different Number skills: Special groups of numbers and their relationships, index notation, estimations of the square root of a non square number, prime factors.

Students challenged each other to a game of 'Checkmath" where they used their knowledge of factors and multiples to beat their opponent. There might have been some incentives to work out winning strategies!

Students have been doing a great job filling out their 'RRR journals' at the start of each class and have shown real progress in their efforts to include appropriate mathematical language and precise definitions as part of their write ups.

The grades 5 & 6 students have some awesome projects coming up, but they need to collect the popup lids from pop top bottles as well as lids from 600ml drink/water bottles. We will need LOTS. #### **Cultural capabilities - refugees and migrants**

Our Year 5/6 students have been exploring the Civics and Citizenship topic, 'Cultural capabilities' and have been learning about migrants, asylum seekers and refugees. Students have been hearing personal stories about people and the reasons that they may want or need to move to Australia. Classroom discussions about refugees have taken place about positive and negative cultural stereotypes, the legalities of refugees, the misguided assumption that these people are often 'boat people' and our obligations as global citizens. To help contextualize this even more, we invited Kate Palmer and Hayley McCosh from the Settlement, Engagement and Transition Support Program (SETS) from South West Healthcare (SWHC) into the classroom to describe the human side of the often faceless masses of people we see in the media. Their role with SWHC involves meeting migrants and refugees and helping them gain access to the necessary services, schools, banking, employment. accommodation, translation services and support that they need. We explored the diversity of cultures and backgrounds in our classes and the cultural iceberg with only 10% of cultural differences readily apparent. Students were invited to meet refugees with a friendly smile, ask them to become involved in community activities and not to take anything for granted as they may have had difficult or different experiences before arriving in Australia. #### What a sweet business idea

"The Business Idea" is Unit One for our Year 11 VCE Business Management students and focuses on the motivations for starting a business, identifying business opportunities and the characteristics of successful business entrepreneurs. We encourage our students to look at local businesses and endeavours through the TAP so we undertook a field trip to 'A Little Bit of Sweet' in Timboon. Michelle Frantantaro, the business owner, described her previous experience owning and operating the Simpson general store / newsagency for 15 years before being casually employed at Berry World. Michelle did not think that she would have another store as she operated her lolly business from home, but an opportunity presented itself with a store in a central location in Timboon and Michelle could see a gap in the local market. The successful business has now been operating for five years and there is a real 'Wow" factor when you walk through the doors, based on customer needs and interest – including the current favourites, snackable boxes, gift hampers, the Pick-n-mix, Burger Bubbles, Camel Balls and Pig Farts!! Thanks Michelle for an educational and delicious field trip!



#### Tasting Timboon - Berry World

Our new Year 9/10 Food Tech elective, "Tasting Timboon" is about exploring the wonderful flavours, products and treats that are produced around Timboon as part of the 12 Apostles Food Artisans Trail. During this elective, students will investigate and research the various businesses and we will invite guests in who will tell their story, describe their produce, explain social, ethical and sustainability considerations their business faces then, later that week, the students will craft a dish based on their produce. Our first guest was Heather Nicholls from Berry World who described the processes involved in preparing the strawberry

mounds by wrapping them in plastic to eliminate weeds and provide drainage with the sides covered in dirt. Over 25,000 strawberry runners are soaked in organic fertilizer, then pushed in through a slit in the plastic in a process that takes 5 months from May onwards. The plants stay dormant until September when they start to shoot and, depending on sunlight, the caylx will start to produce fruit. There are 800 plants in each row with each healthy plant producing between 2-3 kg of strawberries that are picked, classed and sorted into punnets. Imperfect looking, but still flavoursome fruit is used in other Berry World products such as jams and wine with a pick-your-own option as well. The students will be making their own strawberry jam next week, can't wait to taste it!



#### **Tasting Timboon - Keayang Maar Vineyard**

During the Year 9/10 Food Tech elective, "Tasting Timboon" we re exploring the wonderful flavours and products that are produced by many creative producers around Timboon as part of the 12 Apostles Food Artisans Trail. We invited Caitlin Wurlod from Keayang Maar Vineyard into our classroom and she took our students on a journey learning about the grape harvest and wine production in their vine to wine family enterprise. After retiring from dairying, the business was established on Barry and Bernadette Wurlod's property on the volcanic slopes of Keayang Maar in Dixie following holidays in Europe where they learnt about grape growing and wine production. Caitlin and Jerram Wurlod also assist with the daily operations and marketing for the vineyard and Caitlin explained that different grape types produce different wines with flavours dependent on the season, the fermentation process used and the age of the wine. The grapes are picked by hand in late March / early April and put into a crusher, then disstemmer with the juice squeezed out and the wine fermented for 10 days or longer, seasonally producing over 12,000 bottles of wine a year. Caitlin challenged our students to tell the story of the grapes, the who, why and how and to market the Shiraz, Pino Gris- white variety, Pinot Noir and Riesling grapes to potential buyers who could be wine drinkers, other wine makers and retailers by describing the grapes' taste, appearance, production or source. After our students taste tested the grapes, we were very impressed with the marketing terms and descriptive outlines the students crafted. Shortly the students will cook with the wine by cooking the alcohol off but this leave the flavour of the wine intact and it will be used simmer to simmer the meat in their casseroles. It is a 'grape time of the year', thanks Caitlin.



#### Local insights into our outdoor environs

Our VCE Environmental and Outdoor Education students are investigating Australian outdoor environments before humans, the impact of indigenous communities, European colonisation and their relationship with Australian outdoor environments. To contextualize their learning, students visited the Heytesbury and District Historical Museum where local historian Peter Younis was able to provide local, historical context for their queries. Peter was able to describe historical sea levels, the effects of such an active ocean on our limestone coastline, the impact of indigenous people on our coastal vegetation and the changes that have ensued since colonisation. Students learnt about early settlers in Victoria, European history in our region, land use changes and the settlement of Timboon in the 1860s. The major events that had significant impact on our region affecting it's social and economic growth included the lime works, railway, WW1, the Great Depression, and WW2 with extensive land clearing occurred during the Bailey Settlement from 1929-1932 and the 1960s Heytesbury Settlement. Mark Cuthell from the Port Campbell Tourist Information Centre then took the students on a coastal walk where they learnt about various landforms and the uniqueness of the Australian landscape. Mark explained that the cliffs select plants that can adapt to the wind and salt spray with plants and shrubs more vigorous in more sheltered aspects. He described how the vertical cliffs are often eroded into bays that can eventually form sea caves, or arches and then result in stacks such as the 12 Apostles. Did you know, that the limestone in the limestone pit near Timboon is made up of the same vertical layer as the stacks that make up the 12 Apostles! How fortunate are our students to have this local expertise so readily available?





#### An ARTistic message

Yr 9/10 Art students creatively investigated the subject matter of the *Girl with a Pearl Earring*, an oil painting by Dutch Golden Age painter Johannes Vermeer, 1665.

Students used their imagination and creativity to apply paper collage techniques of layering geometric and organic shapes to initially build a colourful background. They then skilfully used the key shapes in the portrait of the *Girl with a Pearl Earring* to carefully construct an aesthetically pleasing and stylised collage. Students applied surface decoration using Posca pens to highlight shape, create emphasis, and generate repetition of pattern.

The results are impressive and provide a colourful display in the senior art area for viewers to enjoy.

## GOOD FRIDAY APPEAL – VOLUNTEER COLLECTORS WANTED!


That time of the year is fast approaching when volunteer collectors will be out and about, rattling their tins and knocking on doors in support of the annual Good Friday Appeal.


