#### **NAPLAN**

Congratulations to all Year 3 and Year 5 students for their efforts during NAPLAN tests. I was very pleased with the persistence the students showed in each test. The Department has not released dates of when we can access results, but the intention of bringing the tests forward from May to March was to get the results out to schools and families a lot earlier.

#### **Teacher Professional Development**

Our focus over the term has been on embedding the 6+1 Writing traits and exploring our strengths and areas of improvement in teaching mathematics. We are part of a regional Community of Practice in Numeracy, where Mrs Claire Watson and myself are

learning about the 8 recommendations (as shown in the graphic) to teaching mathematics.

As a staff, we have chosen to focus on recommendation 5 for term 2. We will begin by conducting peer observations, where staff will view a peer during a session of maths and then give constructive

feedback. We will then do the learning and repeat a peer observation at the end of the term to track our growth. We will

also seek student feedback through conversations and surveys to see if they notice any improvement in how maths is being taught, specifically linking it to their independence and motivation. The Community of Practice will continue all year.

#### **Taste of Timboon**

Year 6 students had the opportunity to savour the great opportunities that the secondary school has to offer in their Taste of Timboon transition day on Wednesday the 29<sup>th</sup> of March.







#### Year 3/4 Week of Tastes.

This week, the students in Years 3 and 4 have been learning about how we taste. This has been part of our Healthy Bones, Healthy Bodies unit this term. On Wednesday, we completed a series of blindfolded tasting activities, where we tried to describe and identify the taste of the foods that we sampled. We experienced sweet, bitter, sour, salty and umami tastes.





We would like to give a big thanks to Tina Hrebenyuk, Maree Williams, Kate Dunne, Camille Nicholls, Jenny Doolan and Rocky Blair for coming along to assist us with the tasting activities. Your help was greatly appreciated and we could not have run the activities without you. Thanks must also go to our amazing TAP Coordinator, Andrea Vallance for all of the preparation that she put into organising this session for us. This was a great learning opportunity and also great fun!







#### **TAP into SWTAFE**

Our Year 9/10 AgHort students are learning about the importance of healthy soils as they prepare to plant out the new garden beds in our school kitchen garden. After a planning session with horticulturalist and TAFE teacher, Trevor Bullen, our students were fortunate enough to be invited to an introductory session at the SWTAFE Sherwood Park facility for a careers and soils workshop. Michelle Parker, Nick Graesser, and Leigh Fary described their various career pathways and updated students about potential opportunities in horticulture including working in gardens, parks, coastal parks, golf courses, curated bowling greens, nurseries, racecourses, in turf management, soil technology, weed or pest management, breeding plants, constructing pavements, landscape design, conservation and landscape construction. A tour of the SWTAFE facilities included the classrooms, garden beds, an automated green house that featured automated fans, openings and misters and participants heard about the horticultural skills that are employed to keep footy ovals, cricket grounds, and parks looking their best. Students learnt how to do soil pH tests on a variety of soils to ascertain whether their sample was made up of acid/alkaline soils. The sample from our school kitchen garden tested slightly alkaline so students will work some compost or organic matter through it to make it more neutral after learning that a pH between 6.5 and 7.5 is usually best for most plants. The class planted their own marigold and lobelia seedlings into two different types of potting mix as practical examples of the importance of planting out seedlings and seeds in the best possible environment. During the visit other examples of courses and opportunities at TAFE were introduced by SWTAFE Agriculture teacher, Rebecca Coleman, who outlined the Agricultural / Horticultural certificates, diplomas and short courses available at TAFE including Chain Saw Maintenance, Chemical Users course, Operate Quad Bikes and Front-End Loader Operations





#### Gear Up!

As part of the TAP, and continuing the focus on farm safety introduced during the Year 5/6 TAP into Farm Safety unit, our Year 9/10 AgHort students were fortunate to be part of the National Centre for Farmer Health's Gear Up program at Timboon P-12. As a significant portion of on-farm deaths and injuries in Australia occur among young people working on the farm, we wanted to provide our Year 9/10 AgHort students with an opportunity to learn about farm safety in a practical, fun manner. Facilitators, Sally Cunningham, Tam Phillips and Cecilia Fitzgerald, introduced the program that builds students' knowledge of farm hazards and understanding of the importance of safe practices to positively influence farm safety behaviours. Through a range of creative, interactive activities students explored agricultural exposures and hazards, working with machinery and livestock, prevention strategies, respiratory health, eye and ear safety, zoonotic diseases, agri chemicals, heat related stress, PPE and wellbeing. We are grateful to Tim Nowel and Nutrien Timboon who supported the delivery of this potentially lifesaving project for these young adults.



#### **Home Safe, Every Day**

To acknowledge Nutrien Timboon's support of our NCFH Gear Up for Ag workshop, and as a timely reminder of the importance of farm and workplace safety, we invited Tim Nowell, the Branch Manager of Nutrien Ag Solutions into the Year 9/10 AgHort classroom. Tim described his career pathway starting as a light engine mechanic with a local Kawasaki dealer, through to Ford Motor Company as a Group Leader in the stamping plant, owning his own livestock transport business, then working in quarries and mines, managing the construction of the Western District Livestock Exchange through to his current role. As these roles involved managing change, redevelopment and overseeing work teams, workplace safety was high on his radar, especially following the death of a team member in a mining accident. He is reminded of this incident daily and this unnecessary fatality has prompted him to take a lead on workplace safety in the organisations he is involved in. Tim stressed the importance of building a culture of safety by ensuring that 'if something isn't safe, make it safe and if you can't make it safe, don't do it'. By providing examples from his life and incidents that impacted his colleagues, students learnt that it was important to report near miss and incidents as these could escalate to a major injury or fatality. The significance of not taking shortcuts or not concentrating on a task was emphasized as was the importance of using safe facilities or refusing to work in unsafe conditions. Tim also spoke about the importance of mental health and wellbeing including starting conversations with the TradeMutt shirts, supporting Dolly's Dream, RUOK and understanding people. This very powerful lesson resonated with all of the students and we are extremely grateful for Tim's passion for keeping people safe and his candour and honesty in this important message for our young people and their families.



Our VCE Environmental and Outdoor Education students are investigating Australian outdoor environments before humans, the impact of Indigenous communities, European colonisation and their relationships with Australian outdoor environments. To contextualise this knowledge, our VCE students rode to Port Campbell where local historian and member of the Heytesbury and District Historical Society, Peter Younis, provided local, historical context for their queries. Peter was able to describe historical sea levels, the impact of Indigenous people on our coastal vegetation and the changes that have ensued since colonisation. Students learnt about early settlers in Victoria, European history in our region, land use changes and the settlement of Timboon in the 1860s with the establishment of the railway, limeworks, farming, and regional hops plantations. Land clearing, agriculture and establishment of Newfield in the 1870s, the Bailey Settlement in the 1930s and the 1960s Heytesbury

Settlement and their impacts on our regional environments were also discussed. Students' questions about the treatment of Indigenous communities, the settlement of Port Campbell, land use changes, and economic drivers were also reviewed. How fortunate are our students to have this local expertise so readily available? Check out the TAP Blog for more historic photos shared with the class. Thanks Peter!






To introduce the concept of "Healthy Bones, Healthy Body" the Year 3/4 students welcomed into their classroom, ex Timboon P-12 students, Dietician, Casey Tesselaar, and Social Worker, Hayley Weel, both from Timboon and District Healthcare Service. Casey challenged students to describe the role of bones in our bodies and the class discussed the three secret ingredients to healthy bones: calcium, Vitamin D and exercise. Students learnt that calcium can predominately be obtained from dairy foods, but that other non-dairy calcium rich foods could also be included in a healthy diet. The class heard that Vitamin D helped with calcium absorption, and that weight bearing exercise helped build strong bones. Students were encouraged to enjoy a wide variety of nutritious foods every day from the five food groups depicted in the Australian Guide to Healthy Eating (AGHE): Vegetables, Fruit, Grain foods, Lean meats and alternatives, Dairy and alternatives. The classes were then busy creating their own versions of the AGHE to reinforce the healthy eating message. Yummo!



#### Timboon P-12 Year 8's Rock!

To compliment the geology being taught in the Year 8 Science classrooms, we invited ex-Timboon P-12 student and local geotechnical engineer, Jeremy Doolan, into the classroom to provide his expertise to help us better understand rocks, minerals, geology and the range of careers in this field. He explained that Australia contains all known rock types, and the age of some rocks spans over 3.8 billion years. Since the gold rush in the 1850s, Australian mining has become much more industrialized and automated, including the use of AI and it is one of the most important producers of raw mineral product in the world. After obtaining a Bachelor's degree in Geological Engineering, Jeremy worked in open pit and underground mines in Mount Isa in Queensland before becoming a Geotechnical Engineer at the Ballarat Gold Mine, and later the Cadia Mine near Orange, where he worked on Technology and Innovation. Returning to Port Campbell in 2017, he worked in a Fly-in, Fly-out (FIFO) capacity as a Geotechnical Superintendent and Underground Mine Manager. Currently he is working for a consulting/ contracting firm, Operational Geotechs, which allows him to work from home with ad hoc mine site visits when necessary. Jeremy was able to help students understand the difference between open pit and underground mines and the various types of raw materials, equipment, work practices, technology and career options available in today's mining industry in Australia.









#### Crayfest 2023

Crayfest is an annual celebration of Port Campbell and surrounds – the coast, community, volunteers, primary producers, local produce and sustainability! Over sixty of our students, accompanied by teachers and parents, were part of the Crayfest Parade and carried marine creations they had crafted under the guidance of their Art teacher, Mrs Mackieson. Our underwater procession of jellyfish, octopus and koinobori (Japanese carp windsocks) were all part of a colourful celebration of our coastal environs celebrating Port Campbell and all things marine. Timboon P-12 students and staff also provided a live mural for juniors to paint, ocean themed face painting and buntings to acknowledge our TAP Community of Educators. Congratulations to the Crayfest committee for another amazing celebration of our wonderful community!





#### How's this for a classroom!

Following our recent River Detectives PD, our Year 10 Geography class took their investigation of the Curdies estuary outdoors to learn more about the health of waterways in our region. During their field trip to the Curdies River at the trestle bridge near Timboon, Corangamite Catchment Management Authority (CCMA) River Detectives Project Officer, Deirdre Murphy, and Debbie Dalziel, from the Curdies Valley Landcare Network asked students about their knowledge of the Curdies catchment and the impact of land use on water quality. Breaking into groups, the students then tested a water sample from the Curdies and compared this with a sample from the upper Curdies catchment, near Cobden. Students compared water temperature, turbidity, pH, salinity, and reactive phosphorus (nutrient content) of the water and discussed their findings. Ensuing discussions included the impacts of change in nutrient levels in the Curdies catchment that can result in blue green algae blooms, poor water quality and fish deaths. Another group sorted and identified water bugs from the trestle bridge site and considered what happens to biodiversity when there is loss of habitat and what can be done to restore and improve waterway condition. This field trip enabled students to understand the ecological impacts of land use changes and its impact on potential water quality in our region. Thanks Deirdre and Debbie.





## <u>Bandicoots – From a high school graduate to Graduate Ranger</u> at Cradle Mountain

Our Year 10 Science students are investigating endangered species and biosecurity, so we reached out to former Timboon P-12 School student, Abbey Ralph, who is now a Graduate Ranger at Cradle Mountain in Tasmania. After graduating from Timboon, Abbey took a gap year where she originally worked in retail to help save money for a solo backpacking trip around Europe. Upon her return, Abbey enrolled in a Bachelor of Environmental Science at Deakin University where she discovered a new passion and drive for land based environmental science. During her course, Abbey volunteered at wildlife sanctuaries and parks before determining that she wanted to one day return to work in Tasmania. COVID restrictions made internships difficult, so Abbey applied for an Honours year and, as a non-academic person, she knew she was up for a challenge, but couldn't wait to start a fourth year of study in an area that really interested her. Abbey's research year took her to the Grampians National Park where she studied the abundance and distribution of the Long-Nosed Potoroo and the Southern Brown Bandicoot. This research was critical as bandicoots have not been seen in the landscape since 2013 and potoroos not since 2010. Camera traps and vegetation surveys helped establish where they were sighted in the Grampians and also determined the number and type of predators in their environment. Abbey later worked with Parks Victoria and was able to apply the skills about environmental management into practise in real world situations. After project management in Northern Victoria and a search for a new job and an adventure, Abbey applied for the role as Graduate Ranger of Cradle Mountain, a dream location for a job! Her role is made up of a variety of roles including park maintenance, talking to visitors, reviewing permits and walking the walking tracks. As Abbey's career progresses, she will learn all about project planning, firefighting, helicopter operations, supporting search and rescues and volunteer programs. She thoroughly enjoys working in the Cradle landscape and this role in Tasmania is a real adventure! What an office...






#### Week of Taste

Our Year 3/4 students are enriching their vocabulary and learning to describe what they taste as part of the Week of Tastes sensory experience that teaches students how to recognize and appreciate taste and flavour. Decked out in their chef's hats, students had to blind taste a range of foods and describe the flavours they experienced. Students were challenged to use food related words based around the five basic tastes; sweet, bitter, salty, sour and umami (meaty, savoury), and were introduced to piquant (sharp) and sweet/sour combinations. Parent helpers assisted students to discover, predict, experiment and analyse a range of foods with exercises using students' senses of sight, taste, smell, touch and sound. What a brilliant lesson! 


