PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome Back to Term 2

Thank you to all students, staff and families for such a positive start to Term 2. It has been great to see students settle quickly back into learning routines, reconnect with friends and staff, and begin the term with energy and enthusiasm.

This term promises to be another busy and exciting one, with a number of important events, programs and improvements already underway.

Wizard of Oz Auditions and Rehearsals

We are very excited to see the beginning of auditions and rehearsals for our school musical, The Wizard of Oz. The team from Red Door have been incredibly impressed with our students during this week's auditions. They commended our students for being polite, kind, warm and enthusiastic throughout the process. This is a wonderful reflection of our students and the way they represent our school. We look forward to the cast announcement shortly and to seeing the production come together over the coming months.

ANZAC Day Service

Thank you to everyone involved in organising and supporting our ANZAC service. It was a respectful and meaningful occasion, and an important opportunity for our school community to pause, reflect and honour those who have served.

A special thank you to Bernie Dunn for playing the bugle and to Caitlyn Kearney for singing the National Anthem. Both contributions added greatly to the significance of the service.

Holiday Works and School Improvements

A number of important works have taken place across the school during the holiday period:

- Our Shelter in Place works have commenced in the library and are now close to completion. The latest advice from the contractor is that we expect all fencing to be removed by the end of Week 4. These works will provide our school with a building that is fit for use as a shelter in place in the unlikely event of a bushfire during the school day. The improvements are designed to help the building better resist ember attack and include the removal of combustible materials from the surrounding area. Once the works are complete, we will look to reinstate an appropriate garden in this space.
- We have also had acoustic works completed in the JS3 classrooms and the Pavilion classroom. These improvements have made a significant difference to noise levels in these learning spaces, creating calmer and more effective environments for students and staff.

Attitudes to School Survey

Next week we will begin the Attitudes to School Survey for all students in Years 4 to 12. Families are encouraged to read the Compass post for further information.

This is an important survey that helps us better understand our students' perspectives and needs. Student voice plays a valuable role in helping us reflect on what we currently provide and where we can continue to improve. In the past, feedback from the Attitudes to School Survey has helped inform a range of programs and changes across the school, including our Respectful Relationships curriculum, curriculum planning, timetable adjustments, extended home groups, the introduction and implementation of School Wide Positive Behaviour Supports (SWPBS), wellbeing initiatives such as Maggie the dog, and many other improvements.

We value the opportunity to hear directly from students and use their feedback to continue strengthening our school.

Thank you again for a great start to the term. We look forward to working together across Term 2 and continuing to provide a positive, supportive and engaging school environment for all students.

Year 8 Art students have been exploring the importance of sustainability in contemporary art practice by creating innovative sculptures from recycled and discarded materials that would otherwise end up in landfill. Through this process, students investigated how everyday waste such as plastics, cardboard and packaging can be transformed into meaningful artworks, challenging perceptions of value and encouraging creative problem-solving.

This unit emphasised the art-making process, with students experimenting, refining and resolving their ideas while considering both aesthetic qualities and structural design. Alongside developing their practical skills, students also examined the environmental impact of waste, and the role artists can play in promoting more sustainable futures. By reimagining materials and reducing reliance on new resources, students gained a deeper understanding of how art can communicate powerful messages about conservation, responsibility, and environmental awareness.

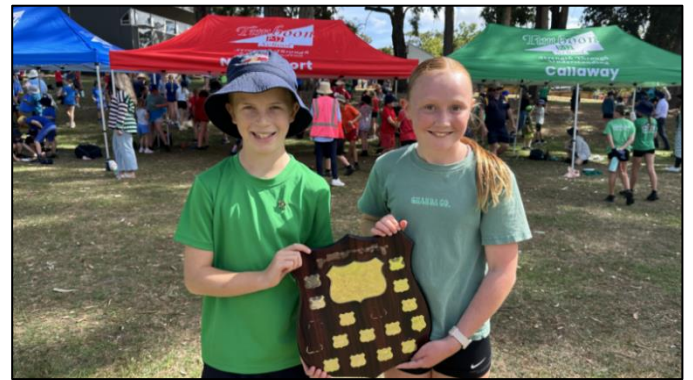

Book Launch - "Timboon Tales: Celebrating 150 Years"



'Do you recall what Timboon was like in the olden days?' This was the question asked by Mr Braham and the 2025 Year 9/10 Extension Humanities students to a group of chronologically advanced Timboon residents as part of the TAP contribution to the Timboon 150 Year celebration. In March last year, students captured the oral histories and stories of 15 local residents and invited 14 others to contribute narratives and tales of the establishment of the Timboon township. The intent was for our young people to record the lives of elders in the community, and they have published shared stories of resilience, tragedy, persistence and humour. By exploring the experiences of other people, students hopefully learnt more about themselves, developed their writing skills, learnt about the history of the local area, felt more connected to the community and know that they have created part of a legacy. Congratulations to Edward, Maya, Matilda, Blake, Sylvia, Nick, Chace, Josh, Toby, Jess and Lochie on these wonderful historical narratives. During the book launch, attended by Mr Braham and students, our contributors were presented with a copy of the book and a certificate. Whilst sharing morning tea, the interviewees and interviewers reviewed the narratives together with lots of memories and laughs. Craytastic!

What a weekend! The TAP and Timboon P-12 School were well represented at Port Campbell's annual Crayfest festival that showcased our local food and beverages, artists, musicians and talent with a focus on sustainability, seaside vides, crayfish and community. The Year 9/10 Sungold couture, high fashion garments, created at TAP's On! 2025, were included in the Flotsam and Jetsam art exhibition that showcased our talented regional artists with students also performing in bands over the weekend. Mr Rowbottom and the Vocational Major (VM) students, and friends, introduced the concept of Precious Plastics and demonstrated how plastic bottle caps could be recycled and

turned into new objects such as carabiniers or bag tags. Utilizing the Precious Plastics shredding, extrusion, and injection machines we were able to purchase with a grant from Beach Energy, students were able to have conversations with attendees about limiting plastic use, recycling and circular economies as the extrusion handle was cranked. Younger festival goers made good use of our Crayfish ring toss and cornhole boards while our vollen photo boards were once again very popular – how will you volunteer? Congratulations to the organizers and everyone involved in this wonderful festival!



Paddock to Plate - Dairy determining

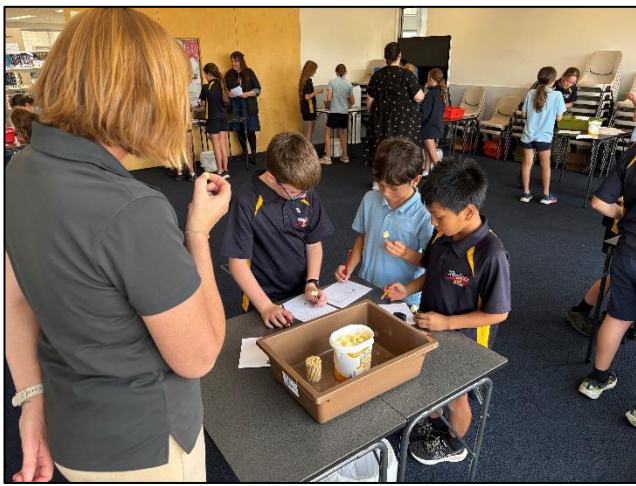
To help introduce the Paddock to Plate topic and to gain a better understanding of the different types of dairy products available, we welcomed Laura Field and Rebecca Korpershoek from Saputo Australia into the classroom to issue a taste test challenge to our Year 3/4 students. After describing the pathway from farm to fridge and reinforcing their learning about pasteurization and homogenization, students discussed the various ways dairy products are produced. Students learnt that skim milk was full cream milk with fat removed, cream was extracted from full cream milk and that butter could be made from cream. The class learnt that yoghurt was fermented from milk with probiotic bacteria, that curds and whey were used to produce cheese and that custard was made from milk, eggs, starch and flavours. Plant based milks were also discussed with students learning that some people with dairy allergies preferred plant-based milks such as soy, almonds or rice milk. Students then had to identify and describe how the various samples appeared, their look, texture, smell and finally taste full cream milk, custard, skim milk, yoghurt, soy milk, cheese and cream. An examination of the fat content concluded the challenge with some surprising results. Dairy delicious!



Weed warriors

A feature of the Timboon Agriculture Project - TAP - is that we can 'tap' into the expertise and experience of community members to help contextualise the classroom learning to really enhance learning opportunities. Our Year 5/6 Science students are investigating habitats and how human activity affects the growth and survival of organisms, so Mr Mottram chose weeds as a local, tactile example. We invited Jess Maxwell, the Environmental Protection Officer from the Corangamite Shire and Dean Drayton, an environmental weed contractor, to talk about weeds and weed control in our region. Students heard that the Corangamite Shire controls over 2200 km of roadside vegetation and Jess' job is to recognise, map and control weeds on these verges and then employ contractors to help manage them. Weeds are plants growing in the wrong spot and potentially causing harm to the environment, farm animals, buildings, agriculture and can cost a lot of money to control or eradicate. Jess and Dean explained that invasive species were non-native plants that caused environmental damage and were often pests or noxious weeds. Our students learnt about human's impact and the importance of early control or the safe removal of these invasive species and the role that they can play to help protect our environment from harmful weeds.





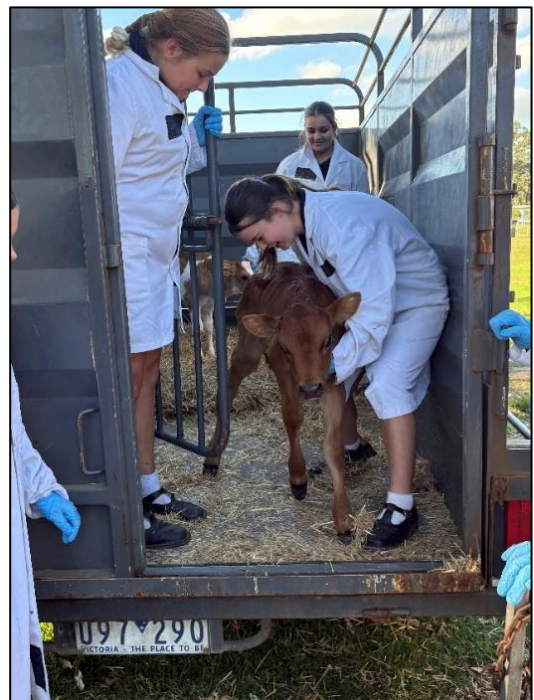
Aussie Wool Pellets in the Shark Tank

Our Year 5/6 Information and Communications Technology (ICT) students have been challenged by Mrs Pechotsch and Mr Mottram to come up with ideas or innovations that solve problems to be presented at a Shark Tank expo later this term. To inspire some entrepreneurial thinking, we invited winner of the 2023 Ideas Place Pitch Night, the Inventions Competition at Sheepvention, and recently featured on 'Landline', entrepreneur, Sherri Symons, into our classroom to motivate our students. Sherri, a wool classing trainer for South West Institute of TAFE as well as a prime lamb and beef cattle producer, invented Aussie Wool Pellets to create a market and use for low value wool. She described her career pathway and the process that lead to the development of the pellets that are biodegradable, aerate the soil, hold 3 x their weight in water and help complete the carbon cycle. Sherri introduced her award winning 'plankton pots' and wood plant matting that used the properties of wool to enhance and protect plant growth. Motivating students to pitch their own ideas, she stressed that they need to consider what problems they are trying to solve, what are they passionate about, what is their creations purpose and who would be their target audience. Sherri galvanized students to seek opportunities and to step outside of their comfort zone but not to be daunted by the obstacles that they could face. Our Year 5/6 classes were definitely inspired with many commenting that they had more ideas for their own presentations and were looking forward to the Shark Tank Expo experience.



Hello Shakira and Charli, our 2026 CCC calves

This week our Year 7 Science students excitedly welcomed our Cows Create Careers (CCC) calves, Shakira and Charli, generously loaned by ex-student and dairy farmer, Peter Fulton, who has been our CCC calf advocate for over 10 years. During the next 3 weeks, the calves' health and growth will be monitored by our students. Peter outlined the feeding regime required for the calves that included feeding pellets, milk powder, grass, hay with clean water and keeping the calves' bedding clean. Ms Allen and students will adhere to a strict feeding regime and students will be rostered on to feed the calves everyday. During their first feed, the Jersey cross calves' weight was recorded with the brown and white calf, Shakira, weighing 38kg while her red herdmate, Charli, weighed 46kgs. The Dairy Australia / Gardiner Foundation program, facilitated by DeeJay Events, has been offered for several years as a cornerstone of the TAP, but this year there is a program re-evaluation with a 'light-touch' version of the program offered to schools with virtual calves. Fortunately, our dedicated Science teachers, Mrs Dennis and Mrs Watson wanted our students to work with real calves so we are incredibly appreciative of our supportive CCC team. We would like to acknowledge the support of our sponsors including Deanne and John from Jaydee Events who facilitate the CCC competition, Maxum Foods who provided 2 bags of MaxCare premium Milk Powder and Reid Stockfeeds who donated 3 bags of Calf Rearer.
