PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It has been fantastic to see the continued progress and hard work from our students this Term 1. We've certainly had a full and exciting term so far, with many important dates being shuffled to ensure maximum participation. We appreciate your understanding as we worked to accommodate as many students as possible in our sporting events, academic activities, camp experiences, and parent-teacher interviews. It is fortunate that it is a 10-week term 1 this year, and we're grateful for everyone's flexibility to make this all happen!

Reporting

We are currently discussing and finalising the proposed changes to our reporting system with the School Council, with a focus on ensuring it meets the needs of our students and families. These discussions will be finalised in Week 8, and we are excited to present the updated system soon. Parent-teacher interviews will be held on Friday, 21st March, and I encourage all parents to book a time via the Compass system once the interview booking portal opens. Please refer to my recent Compass post for more details on this. Alongside the parent-teacher interviews, we will also be releasing a simplified interim report, which will highlight two key categories: effort and behaviour. These will be sent out shortly before the interviews.

Racism and Violence

At our school, we are committed to building a strong and supportive student body and broader community. The Department of Education takes a zero-tolerance approach to any form of violence or racism, and we as a school stand firmly against behaviour that marginalises others based on their race or background. We recognise that language and terms, particularly on social media, can often perpetuate harmful stereotypes and attitudes, and we aim to educate students about the profound impact these words can have. I encourage all parents to engage in open conversations with their children about the importance of respectful communication, particularly online and when at school. Resources to support these conversations are available, including those offered by organisations such as [ReachOut](#) and [Australian Human Rights Commission](#), which provides information and age-appropriate strategies for addressing these issues. Please know that we will continue to follow our behaviour management processes to address these matters, and restorative practices will be implemented to support students in learning from their actions.

School Council Update

We are pleased to announce the nomination of two new parents to the School Council. Congratulations to Bec McAuliffe and Mat Whitehead who fill our two available parent positions. We also have three staff members who have nominated for the three available staff positions – congratulations to Lisa Pechotsch, Shelley Mutton, and Gill Hampson for stepping forward in these roles.

Teachers are doing an incredible job fostering engaging and supportive learning environments, where students are making great strides academically and personally. Thank you to all staff for their hard work and dedication, and to our students and families for their continued support.

Timboon 150 - Walking tour

Following the success of our 2024 publication, “Curdies Tales; Stories of the river by it’s people”, our 2025 Year 9/10 Humanities students are going to interview long term Timboon residents about their memories and recollections of our township as we join locals to celebrate ‘Timboon 150’. To contextualize the creation of the township and region, we took our budding interviewees for a walking tour of Timboon to garner local knowledge and provide perspective for these stories. Our hosts were ex veterinarian and current President of the Heytesbury and District Historical Society, Peter Younis, and ex dairy farmer and local footy legend, Doug Trigg. Peter and Doug regaled us with stories of the establishment of a town surrounded by rugged bush, transport provided by bullock teams and trains, the limeworks, buildings being moved by traction engines, the railway platform and storage sheds and the thousands of fat lambs that were regularly sold through local yards behind the current Nutrien buildings. Referring to local photos, students learnt about the role of telephone exchange and post office and local shops including those selling shoes, a butcher, chemist, grocer, Dalgety’s and a barber who used to visit the school to cut students’ hair! Peter described the arduous journey of a local doctor who transported a woman in labour by pushing a trolley car along the railway track to Cobden and the role of ex Timboon local, Des Ball, in preventing a nuclear holocaust. We can’t wait to hear more of these stories over the following weeks.

Year 11 Career exploration - Sports Physiologist

As we commence our Year 11 Career awareness program, we are grateful to Tanya Wines, the Director of Community Health at Timboon and District Healthcare Services (TDHS), for facilitating members of her team to talk to our students about their career pathways. James MacAuslan is an Exercise Physiologist and the Manager of the TDHS Allied Health unit that includes dietetics, diabetic educators, social workers, podiatrists, occupational therapists and physiologists.

James suggested that there is no one pathway into allied health and that his own route started with an Elite Athlete pathway into university, deferring his course after one year to work as an apprentice chef for two years. He returned to university to complete study as an Exercise Physiologist after placements and training experiences preferring the Physiologist role rather than that of an Exercise Scientist who worked in a lab with individuals to assess or improve their performance.

As an Exercise Physiologist he runs clinical exercise groups; open rehabilitation groups or chronic disease exercise groups, assesses people post-surgery or injury and helps people progress back to normal with back to work programs or rehabilitation after injury or surgery.

James discussed the most common injury that young adults acquire citing ACLs or shoulder injuries for males and ACLs for females and recommended that they can be avoided by warming up properly with steady activity and using light walking or stretching to cool down with an emphasis on good nutrition as a sound part of recovery.



A Timboon player on the world stage

Prior to the Timboon 150 celebratory weekend, we were delighted to accept Bob Bowker's suggestion to address the Year 10 and 11 students about his recollections of growing up in a small rural town and how it helped prepare him to work on a world stage. Bob's family have been living around Princetown for seven generations and his Great Grandfather was Dr Daniel Curdie, one of the first settlers who explored the Curdies River and Heytesbury Forest. Bob encouraged the students, like the early settlers, to make the most of what they've got and that they were very fortunate to be supported by a rural community who were invested in their students and helped provide opportunities for them. Despite having to study French by correspondence in his senior years at school, he was indebted to the community who found him a French speaking tutor in Port Campbell so that he could succeed in becoming bilingual. Later working as an Australian diplomat, intelligence analyst, academic and company director in the Middle East, he learnt that there are no black or white answers in the Arab world and the consequences of government policies. He became very conscious of situational awareness; who and what you're dealing with, an ability to read the room, absorb how they view the world but not to get caught up in their perceptions of the world. As a public servant representing Australian interests abroad, he was reliant on his ability to problem solve, be practical and to understand how things fit together; many of the skills he developed growing up in Timboon. Bob described the role of Des Ball, another of Timboon's 'exports', who acquired such a level of understanding about the potential impact of nuclear weapons on the world that he was able to influence American policy to have a nuclear treaty signed at a very unstable moment in time. After the presentation, Bob gifted the Timboon School library a copy of his book, "Tomorrow there will be Apricots", a memoir of a Timboon boy who evolved into an international diplomat, definitely an insightful presentation for our students.

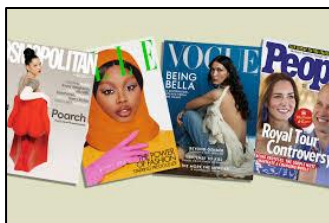
